Approaching Construction

- ▶ When approaching a construction zone in Alberta, drivers will generally pass through three outer zones.



Zone 1

- ▶ Adjust your speed to gradually slow down to the posted speed limit. Slow down further if visibility or conditions are poor.
- ▶ Always leave plenty of space between your vehicle and other people, and equipment parked or being operated at these locations.
- ▶ If your lane is blocked and no one is directing traffic, yield to oncoming traffic.
- ▶ Be aware of and prepared for motorists who might cut in front of you or stop unexpectedly.

Driving Through Construction



- ▶ If convicted of speeding through a construction zone, fines are doubled, even if there are no signs and workers are present.
- ▶ Be patient, expect delays and be aware your trip may take a little longer.
- ▶ Road construction can happen at any time and doesn't just occur in the daytime hours.
- ▶ Obey directions by flag people or other construction workers.
- ▶ Be on the lookout for construction workers and machinery, and be prepared to stop should they enter your lane. The faster you drive, the longer it will take to stop.
- ▶ Steer clear of construction barrels and cones. Hitting these puts construction workers at risk and can cause damage to other vehicles.
- ▶ There may be less obvious/hidden hazards which can damage vehicles such as fresh oil, loose gravel chips, and uneven pavement.
- ▶ Do not speed up prematurely. Only start accelerating once you've seen signage clearly stating you've left the construction zone.
- ▶ Large construction vehicles require extra time and space to stop and turn. Avoid their blind spots. Keep in mind, if you can't see the driver, they likely can't see you.
- ▶ Don't drive distracted! Not only is texting and driving illegal, but construction adds additional unfamiliarity to your route and requires your undivided attention.
